at a time**

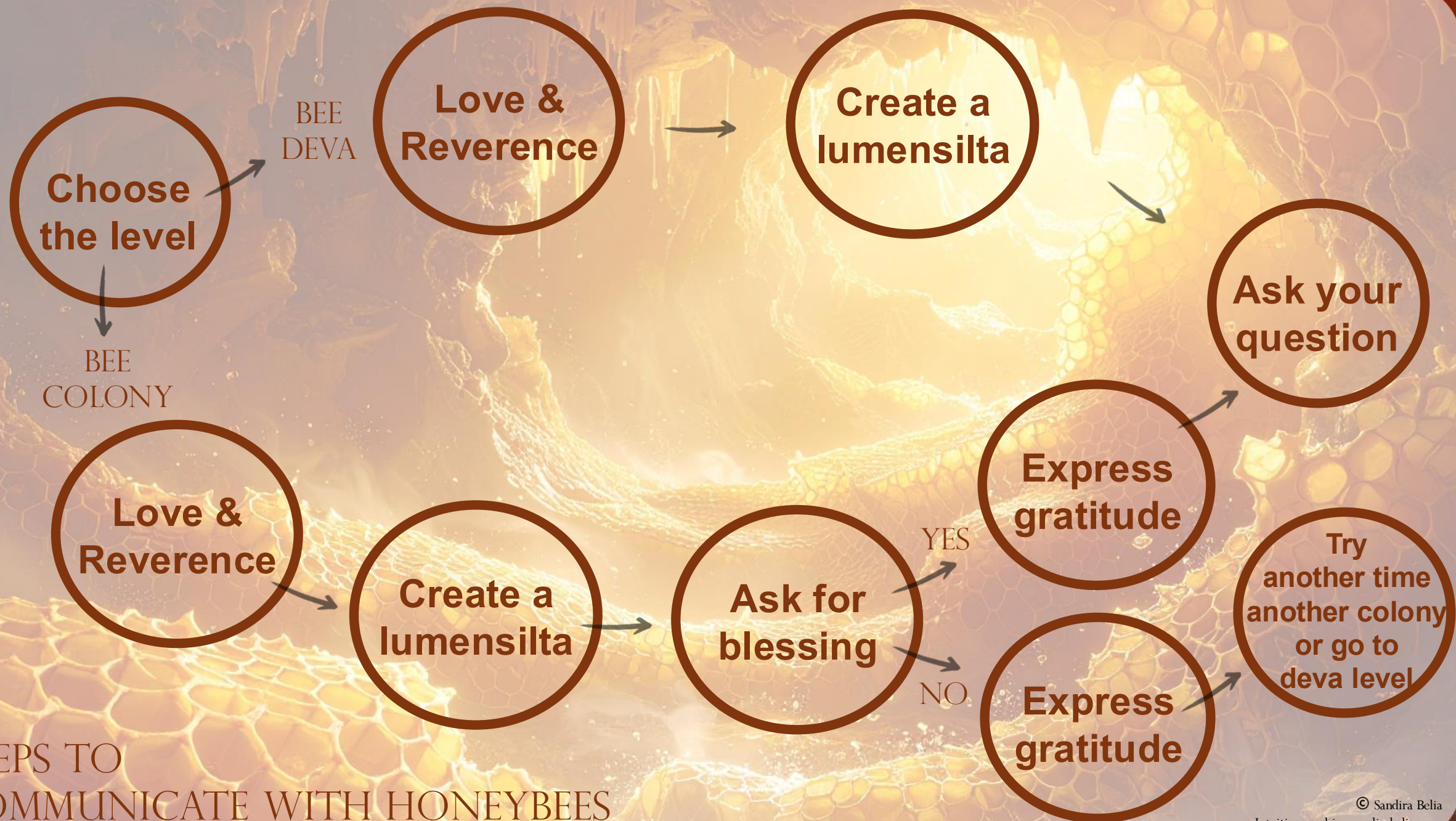

A FEW THOUGHTS

Meaning of the Name: Lumensilta

“Lumen” can be read as the Latin lumen meaning “light,” with Indo-European roots in “brightness.”

“Silta” in Finnish means “bridge.”

As a coined name, “Lumensilta” means a “bridge of light” (Latin + Finnish).

I came across this word in a book by animal communicator Amelia Kinkade.

Developing the Practice

- Keep the communication process light and playful. Don't be too serious!
- Over time, with practice, the steps will naturally merge into one smooth flow.

Understanding a “No”

- There can be many reasons why a colony says no to a communication. For example:
- The Hive Being is occupied with another task.
- The hive has experienced a trauma.
- You approached too quickly out of alignment.
- The hive needs space or time to adapt to something (for example, a weather condition, a treatment, or a predator).
- ...

Beyond Judgement

The spirit of the bees exists beyond the judgmental reality of good and bad.

A bee colony may express a preference, for example regarding a location, a practice, or a way of interacting.

However, it will not communicate in terms of moral judgment by saying, “It is bad to do this.”

Instead, it may simply indicate that one option is more harmonious, more supportive, or more aligned with its wellbeing than another.
